Sport School on Forest School

It has been a fabulous term of forest school for reception, year 1 and year 2. We have experienced the full change of seasons from the Summer ending, through all that Autumn brings and into Winter. Children learn about seasonal changes during this phase of schooling; seeing it happen and watching the flora and fauna transform and adapt is one of the many ways forest school adds to children's classroom learning. It is also fantastic for inspiring curiosity, observations and understanding the change in seasons in a much more profound way. Forest school time allows children to engage with a natural, ever changing environment and this can be unpredictable and fantastic for resilience building when the weather gets colder, or we can't light the fire due to rain, we have to be flexible, prepared for any eventuality and ready to embrace challenges.

One absolute delight of this term that took over, was our apple harvest! Seeing our trees laden with bright, juicy, plump apples inspired so much of our fire-based cooking, and we cooked them in as many different ways as we could come up with! We have toasted apples rolled in cinnamon sugar, made apple pancakes, apple fritters, apple jumbles and on wet days, when we couldn't light the fire, we just enjoyed fresh, crisp, sweet apples straight from the tree.

We have also been practicing using real tools. We've had the bow saw and the hand drill (brace and bit) out this term and are making some festive decorations to bring home. Using real tools encourages children to develop their sense of responsibility as well as giving real purpose and meaning to something they are making. It can be hard work too which builds strength, coordination and grit.

We have also been exploring our senses and love our new forest school song- why not ask your child if they can sing it to you? We are on our way to forest school, forest school, forest school, we're on our way to forest school-what will we see/hear/smell/taste/touch?

The wonders that have come out of these sessions are often in the unplanned moments and forest school is a time to allow children to take charge of their own ideas. To support this we have a range of lose parts, imaginative areas like our mud kitchen, a willow den area, our mini Minack, and lots of craft and construction items. Children also have time to work on social and emotional skills, we see so many collaborative projects and leadership qualities that begin to emerge when children form a team. The older children in the group are often given additional responsibilities managing areas during tidy up time and preparing and lighting the fire. Older children are also encouraged to become teachers to the younger ones who may not yet know skills like how to tie knots or make sparks with the flint and steel.



Why attendance matters

At St Buryan Academy we take attendance seriously. Good punctuality and high attendance helps promote a child's success and happiness in and out of school.

High attendance fosters:

Positive attitudes towards learning

Higher chances or achieving (or surpassing) academic development

The best chances to develop and foster friendships and social skills

Did you know that?

School is open for children for 195 days - meaning they already get 170 days off each year!

90% attendance is still 4 weeks off school each year!

80% attendance = 1 day a week off over 5 years = 1 full year of school missed!

Over a year, 10 minutes late each day is 6 full days of school

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

GE RESTRICTION

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Online videos are often associated with apps such as YouTube, but among teens, TikTok is king. The app provides a potentially addictive, never-ending stream or snort clips tallored to users interests based on their viewing habits. Around half of British children use TikTok, and while most content is benign, Ofcom considers it the app where young people are "most likely to encounter a potential harm"

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

TikTok's Following Feed shows videos from known creators, while the default For You Feed serves endless clips based on viewing history. Most are enaless cips a based on viewing history, most are harmless, but unsuitable content can still appear, and watching for long enough signals interest to the algorithm. Although TikTok bans illegal or inappropriate uploads, the volume of posts means some slip through, increasing the chance that children encounter age-inappropriate material before it is detected or removed.

BODY IMAGE AND DANGEROUS CHALLENGES

Ofcom reports that most online harms for girls involve body image, while boys more often see dangerous stunts. Both types appear frequently on TikTok and spread quickly through its engagement-driven algorithm. Harmful challenges have included the "blackout" trend, where users hel their breath until passing out. Families filed lawsuits after children died linked to the trend, showing how extreme or risky content can rapidly reach young people and negatively influence them.

IN-APP SPENDING

TikTok is free, but children can still spend money TikTok coins, costing £9.99 to £224.99, let users buy gifts for creators. TikTok Shop adds risk by allowing sometimes leading to poor-quality items driven by persuasive marketing. A Canadian investigation found TikTok collected personal data from many children for targeting and advertising despite age limits, meaning young users may lose control over their personal information.

CONTACT WITH **STRANGERS**

Between 1.6 and 1.9 billion people use TikTok meaning there's a high risk of unwanted attention from strangers. Accounts created by over-16s (or young people using a fake date of birth) are set to public view by default. This means that not only is someone's profile visible to everyone else on the app, it also suggests their videos to others and allows

but they can expose young people to harmful ideas Misinformation is common, and Ofcom reports that nearly one third of 12–15-year-olds use TikTok as a news source, increasing the chance of seeing racist, brief clips can influence impressionable users and critical thinking, propaganda and online influence

ADDICTIVE DESIGN

TikTok's fast-paced stream of eye-catching videos can be potentially addictive for young users. In 2024 UK children spent an average of 127 minutes per day on the platform, double the time recorded in 2020. Excessive use can disrupt sleep, increase irritability, and distract from healthier activities. Constantly skipping between short clips may also affect attention span, making it harder to focus on longer tasks such as homework or reading.

Advice for Parents & Educators

ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING

Family Pairing allows parents to link their TikTok account to their child's in order to manage settings remotely. Parents can then turn on Restricted Mode (reducing the chances of a child seeing inappropriate content), set screen time limits make accounts private and manage whether their child can send messages – and if they can, to whom. Children cannot alter these settings without parental approval.

DISCUSS THE DANGERS

If a child wants to use TikTok and you're happy for them to do so, it's good personal information or respond to dangerous trends, and that they know to talk to a trusted adult if they're worried by interactions on the app. With more teens using TikTok

BLOCK IN-APP SPENDING

Parents can restrict in-app purchases on iPhone and Android devices to prevent accidental or impulsive TikTok spending. Young people can easily spend large amounts on TikTok coins or low-quality products promoted through TikTok Shop. If a disappointing purchase occurs, turn it into a discussion about influencer marketing

READ THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that a child is spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the signs. Increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags


